Chloé Harris Portfolio



Chloé Harris (1998) is a Theatre Director originally from London, UK but moved to Amsterdam, The Netherlands for her studies in 2018. In 2023 she graduated from Theatre Directing at The Academy of Theatre and Dance in Amsterdam.

Using the disciplines of text, lighting, sound and acting she creates visually striking absurd theatre which blurs the lines between fiction and reality. We don't just live in a world where only our reality has an impact on what we feel and think. But our internal mind i.e. our dreams. And for Chloé this line between both realities is the perfect breeding ground to make theatre.

From drawing inspiration from the text and the space, she uses mood boards, films, and drawings to translate her vision to her team. Which is starting point of creating her cinematic non chronological style. She frequently works with sound designer Berend van Leer and lighting designer Sander Schaalt. They met when they were students in Amsterdam.

Currently she is maker at Hollandse Luchten in Alkmaar where her work has been at Over Het IJ Festival, Hal25 and Fabrique Unique. In June 2025 she has a residency at The Toneelschuur and in October 2025 she will premiere 'Niemandsland' a new play written by Aron Goossens at Zaal 3 Den Hague.

In previous years she has worked with Robert Icke, Eline Arbo and Titus Muizelaar.

Alongside directing, Chloé works as a theatre director surtitles translator, translating Dutch plays into English for (inter)national tours. Currently she works at NITE and will translate 'Nachtwacht' directed by Guy Weizman in 2025.












Niemandsland follows Ritza, Alex, and Yves as they create a micro-nation to escape Dutch society and live autonomously. Guided by their "anti-growth" philosophy, they face the challenges of survival within their self-made reality, confronting societal rejection and their own inner conflicts. The performance explores the limits of autonomy and the struggle for a new way of living.









X, a group of astronauts on a research station on Pluto lost contact with Earth while investigating its habitability. As time passed, they realised their clocks had stopped working, and each astronaut experienced time differently—weeks, months, or years. This growing confusion led to strange visions, including a mysterious girl and a trapped bird. X explored themes of isolation, disorientation, and the blurred line between reality and illusion in deep space.

In a new adaptation of Sarah Kane's *Crave*, this moment was the characters' last cry for help. C, A, B, and M relived a past event and tried to understand what had brought them together. No one knew what had happened, what was happening, nor what would happen. The answer was often right under their noses, but everyone had different versions of events. What they discovered could have killed them, but if they didn't fight to find the truth, it would have tormented them forever. Through a violent use of language and the continual haunting of the past, *Crave* made us question whether they were truly unaware of what happened, or if they lied to save themselves.







The People That You Meet was a mime performance created through improvisations. This surreal and comedic piece explored the absurdities of modern work culture through three colleagues who, exhausted by the relentless grind, gathered after work to engage in a bizarre ritual of "humping" everyday objects. Their exaggerated actions symbolised an attempt to reclaim control and humor in a world where everything felt like labor. Everything is work, everything is hard work and these three characters had enough of it and quite literally wanted to fuck it!


